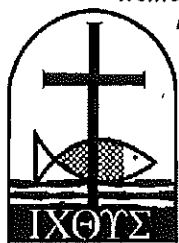

Our guests are just like you and me and I know it's a hard time for them to go through, so if I can make it just a little bit easier I'll continue to do what I can, like this time, and this is a first for me, I'm preparing a dinner. On Sunday morning when it's time for our guests to leave us for their next host church it's comforting to know that there are other volunteers to continue the support. Are you one of those volunteers? If not, consider stepping out of that comfort zone, you'll be glad you did.
